

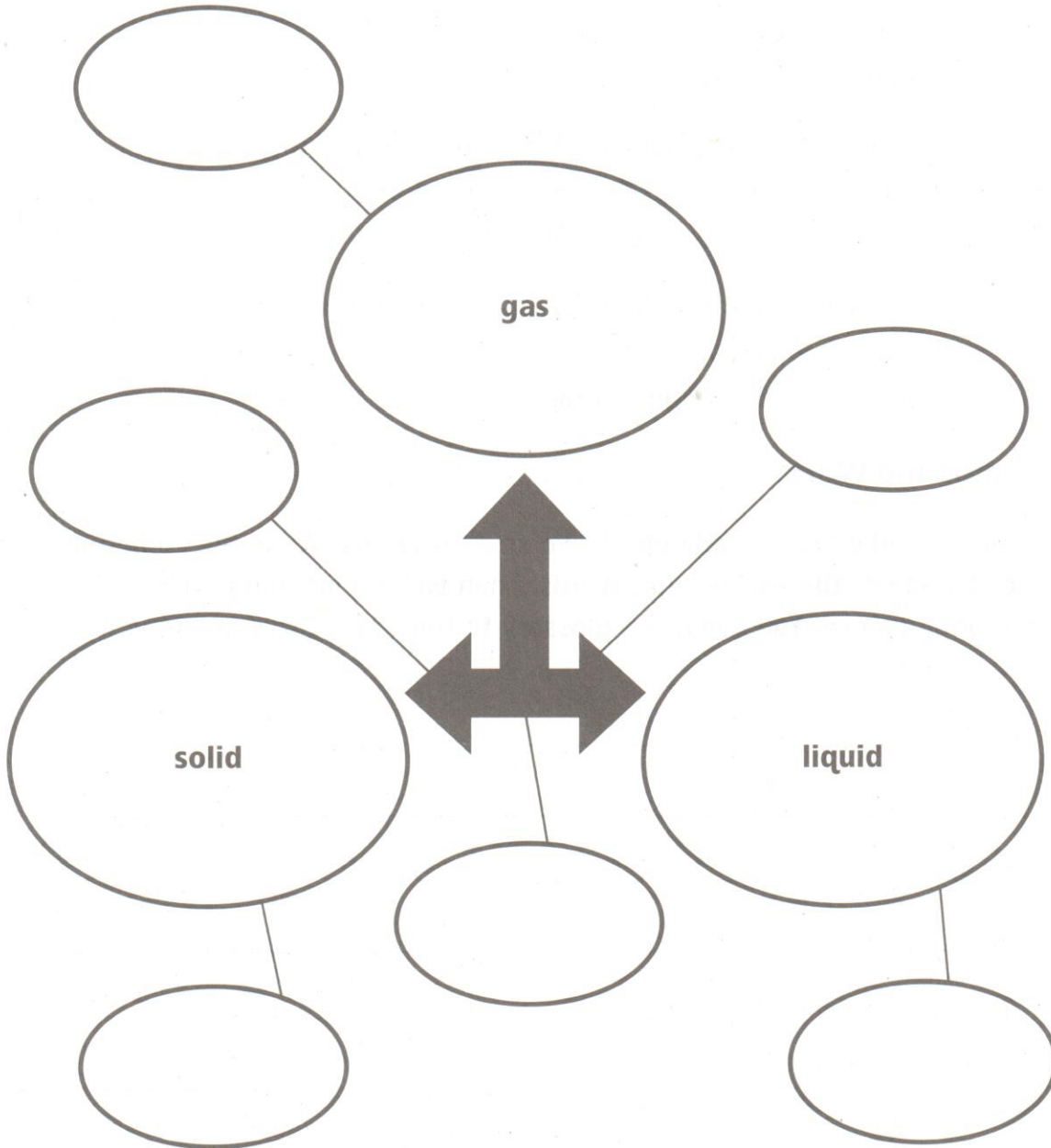

An element is a substance that is made up of only one type of atom. Elements can be classified into groups. Among the different kinds of groups of elements are the metals and the nonmetals.
